April finds us one month closer to the Triennial VIII and preparations are in full swing! Dale Furseth and the Wonder Bread Mafia had their own Work Week and replaced all the aluminum track around Blue Caboose Campground and started the replacement track around Ellingson Turn Table. Their next area of focus will be the track around the Fuel Yard.

The Hope Circle Picnic Shelter is progressing. The lumber for this project was milled onsite from cedar logs harvested from the 242-fire area cleanup. Roger Rude, Gil Dominguez, Curtis Hoopes and Leonard Houpt are leading this project and the timbers and boards are being prepped for construction. Once we get better weather, building the structure will continue.

The Kitsap Live Steamers showed up for the Kitsap Work Week and brought SNOW with them! The weather forced us to concentrate on inside work. It also left us short on attendance. Even so, Ken Olsen, John Bartlow, Jerry Crane, Kirk and Nancy Devine, Pam Williams and Jeff Mills made the trip from Washington State.

Our accomplishments include the erection of a Gantry Crane in the Backshop which was tested by lifting a 1500 lb. locomotive off the floor and onto the elevated tracks. The demolition of the bathroom in the upstairs Loft was quite a feat. It included the removal of a two-person hot tub. Repair of broken pipes due to freezing in the outside handicap Restrooms involved a lot of plumbing work and dedicated efforts by Ken and John.

Some things to keep in mind for the upcoming meets. Please attend the morning briefings to get the most efficient use of valuable volunteer time. Please remember to log your volunteer hours. If you use a hard copy volunteer hour log sheet, please complete one for each person. Better yet, go to the website and record your hours online! This is done by selecting Online Member Resources then select enter Volunteer Hours. These recorded hours are essential to many grants' non-profit requirement for a co-payment.

Please be welcoming and flexible with our activities to take advantage of the opportunity to make new friends and rekindle relationships. First-time attendees to Train Mountain are a potential resource to our membership. We expect a significant increase in visitors at the Visitor Center and Tour Trains always need additional volunteers for Meet & Greet, Conductors and Docents.

Greetings from the front office

Just when I was starting to get used to wearing my lighter spring clothes, the weather turned. We have been getting more snow and colder weather. It was back to the winter gear again. As much as I was enjoying the warmer sunny days we were having, the precipitation is a good thing. We can really use it here.

If you are coming to the 2022 Triennial, please sign up to volunteer. There are many areas that need to have shifts filled. When Quentin Breen first came up with the Triennial, he determined that if **everyone** who attended volunteered at least two hours all of the bases would be covered and everyone could have a great time. It was just expected that all of the adults would volunteer for their shift. It takes a little in excess of 1,200 two hour slots to have everything covered. Though the first Triennial was held at the turn of the century, the same holds true today. The number of attendees determines how many two hour shifts are needed from each person. So, for example, if there are 600 adult attendees, each would need to fill two of the two hour shifts. If there are a little over 1,200 adult attendees, then each would only need to do one two hour shift to have everything covered. It helps with everything Triennial for everyone to sign up for their shift or shifts early. Please get in communication with Danny Chamrad who can let you know which areas need filling and help you sign up. That way no one will be stuck volunteering over 60 hours throughout the entire Triennial in an area just so everyone else can have a good time. With regard to the above and in case you don't know, Train Mountain is manned primarily by many very dedicated volunteers who work diligently to make Train Mountain the wonderful place that it is.

Obtain the description and Inspection Checklist on the [Triennial Information](#) Portal on the TMRR website. You will need to display the 2022 TMRR Steam Engine Inspection Tag to run at the 2022 Triennial.

If you'd like to get a jump on that requirement, we will be offering those inspections during the Narrow Gauge Meet from May 21st through May 29th. The Inspections will be operating during the Work Week as well as the Meet week of the Triennial.

2022 Triennial Passport Game Information - Jim Helwig and Sabra Rickman



April Report

Since my last report the Wonder Bread Mafia (Matt Thomas, Karl Klontz, Craig Cootsona, and Abby Thomas) led by Dale Furseth completed replacing the aluminum track around the Blue Caboose campground with steel rail on plastic ties. In the process they removed a large quantity of roots which tend to make the track very unstable. This group followed up by tuning the track between Hilltop Crossing and the road crossing at the upper end of the Blue Caboose loop. This in turn was followed with upgrades to the yard at Central Station. They replaced three aluminum on wood switches with aluminum on plastic switches. They also replaced several feet of wooden tied track with track built on plastic ties.

The Central Station yard project is ongoing but Dale plans on completing it when and if the snow goes away.

In the track and switch shops Ron Green continues to assemble track panels while Charlie Bill Schubert and I have been replacing wooden ties with plastic on switches we are recycling. Charlie has also machined a few more guard rails to go with the remainder of the previously machined steel switch components.

The used aluminum rail is selling fast but there is still a lot remaining. This is a good deal! We are now bundling the rail in groups of ten sticks (approximately one hundred feet). It sells for \$50.00 per bundle. We also have used tie plates, screws and wooden ties FREE to a good home. The ties are currently being loaded on to pallets for easy loading onto your pickup or trailer. All items here are only available at Train Mountain. We cannot ship or deliver. Upon payment we will set your order aside to await your pickup.

Train Game: Admin Role The Game Within The Game

Most of us know by now that one of the functions of the Train Game is to manage GPS trackers, a database of cars and a website to provide the control and dispatch of Switch Lists and individual car movements for fun and entertainment for everyone. The TG offers full time (seasonal) access for anyone operating their trains at Train Mountain, to use the website for both an informational database about TM as well as The Game manager that offers up “jobs” for Rail Operators to move cars between industries at Train Mountain. The website is full of maps, track layouts, photos and live camera views of all the facilities on our 2200 acre layout. Of course the TG Database keeps track of every movement and tallies points for the person moving the cars in the form of TG\$. No matter what your game, you will know who the winner is.

So what could go wrong? We are not even going to speculate here but we do have a plan to help deal with it when it happens. In addition to the Rail Operator role in Train Game, the role of Rail Admin is available for anyone interested in learning more about the Train Game and working locally and/or remotely to help manage the system and keep the fleet running. The TG system will generate Admin Jobs to correct issues that are beyond the

scope of the regular Rail Operators. For example, “**Find the missing car PFE64278. It was last seen at Lillyville**”. The tasks are more complex but they pay much better in TG\$. It has been suggested that this role should be called Rail Ops Bounty Hunter. The bigger the problem the Admin fixes the richer and more famous they become. In the game that is.

Only Rail Admins see the Admin jobs when they log in. If the Admin is available then they can accept the job in the same fashion as a Rail Operator accepts a movement job. The Admins will have the information and training to keep the game running smoothly. One other requirement of an Admin is that they are willing to get notifications of Admin requests via email or text message. This can be set up to be only when they are near the TM property or anytime.

So there is a game for everyone in the Train Game. And even if you are not playing, the TG website has a mountain of information and help. The Train Game Rail Ops goes into service during the Train Mountain Spring Awakening Meet at the end of April. Please come join us for the Meet and also help us kick off the Train Game.

Our website is still under construction but all members are welcome to connect and check out how we are doing. Please log on and even create a user account. <http://tower.tmr.org>. Try it from your mobile device or PC. The site is fully functional but the cars are not really there. There is no



Help page yet so just wander around and try everything. We are in test mode so nothing matters.

This is always a popular event at Train Mountain and offers something for everyone. This is a great opportunity to experience the entire track at Train Mountain and to take advantage of all the hard work that has been done the past several years on the railroad. If you have not participated in the Operations Meet before, here is a brief description of what it is all about. The railroad will be operated like a full-size railroad with a dispatcher and manned tower. Passenger trains run according to timetables and pick up and deliver “passengers”. Freight crews will set out and pick up freight cars all over the railroad. Points will be accumulated by the crews, and the top crews will be acknowledged. For those who want a more leisurely experience, we offer the option to run as a second-class train without any work to do, or schedule to follow except being out of the way of scheduled trains.

If you plan to attend and have any freight cars not previously used that you wish to add to the inventory, please send a picture of the car to Jim Armstrong at Armstrong.jandg@gmail.com. We welcome additional cars. They should be available to us on Monday or Tuesday of the work week and will be returned on Sunday.

Volunteers are always needed before, during and after the operations. During the early part of the work week, we need people to help with car inspection, car sorting, and on Wednesday we need crews to take the freight cars out and spot them to their initial location. During the operation itself, we need help with the freight office, dispatch, and tower. Sunday, we need plenty of help sorting the returning cars starting first thing in the morning until we finish hopefully early in the afternoon. Please consider helping for at least a couple of hours in one or more of these jobs. They can be a lot of fun.

There is an easement to the home, on a gravel road, that connects to highway 62. A 7 1/2" track loops into the property that connects to the TM main line near dam 3.5.

Friends of Train Mountain will be taking written bids of this property on June 30, 2022. The asking price is \$360,000. Equipment ID Tags for the Triennial

Train Mountain has printed Equipment ID Tags we expect participants in the upcoming Triennial VIII to use. These TAGS will allow us to identify and contact the owner if it is necessary. These tags will have a wire for attachment and can be easily removed once the event has concluded.

One is for Train **Hauling Trailers**. The second one is for **non-steam** Locomotives. **Locomotive** tags will be in the **packet** you receive at Check-in, but the **Trailer tags** will be issued by the crew at **Staging**. Examples of the tags follow.

Please take the time to fill them out and attach each to your equipment. We prefer the trailer tags to be attached to the hitch tongue and the locomotive tags attached to the **left side** of the loco.

Steam engines will be issued a Steam Engine Safety Inspection Tag at completion of the steam engine inspection. Those will be of a different color so each tag can be easily identified by the Safety Inspection Station upon entering the Main line.

Additional or replacement Trailer or Loco tags will be available at the Triennial Event Office. Cooperation with TAG requirements will make Triennial volunteers' jobs easier and benefit everyone in attendance.






2018 Triennial Video Now Available

I AM NOT A ROBOT!

There have been a few changes made to the member's site, specifically where payment information is entered. The most noticeable change is that we have added a question asking if you are a robot. You check the box and depending on a bunch of things, you may be asked to choose from a set of pictures. You may be asked to click the pictures that show street signs, or click on pictures that show store fronts. It seems silly, but the questions and challenges are carefully crafted and updated by Google, and have an amazing success rate at determining if the entity pressing the keys is a real person or a computer program ("robot") trying to gain access.

The technology is called "CAPTCHA", or in our case "reCAPTCHA" and is quickly being the standard for online protection against robots, which pose a real problem to web sites. This is replacing the (to me) very irritating practice of trying to figure out what letters and numbers they are showing in fuzzy text. If you have questions or problems getting around the new challenge (or if you are a robot!), feel free to give Joyce a call in the office.

Please give each article a distinct file name with your name and a date. If everyone submits an article named "article for gazette" or something similar it will often get overwritten by another article with the same name when downloading. **Articles sent as text in a email text will no longer be accepted.**

Please use a common open source FONT such as ARIAL that can be displayed in all Browsers, and is easy to read. Please do NOT use the Calibri font, as we must take the time to convert it to Arial.

If your document has an embedded image, you must also include the image separately as a jpg, png, or similar image file.

Visitors to Train Mountain and YOU:

Releases are available in the mailboxes near the office for those times when the office is closed. There are also releases available in the kitchen and in the Back Shop.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM) (Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through

Train Mountain is a NO SMOKING Facility
