International Club Feature Canterbury Society of Model and Experimental Engineers

Canterbury, NZ By Lucinda Gilman

The CSMEE was founded in 1933 by a group of engineers and tinkerers. In its early days, its members built steam engines, $2\frac{1}{2}$ " model steam trains, and even small cars.

In 1948, they gained access to some land in Andrews Crescent, in Addington, at a former gravel pit. The first track was a simple loop. It had no transition curves leading into its 35 meter radius bends, so driving the larger locomotives could be an alarming experience. In 1955 the railway track needed an upgrade, so was completely rebuilt.



The Christchurch Model Boat Club joined CSMEE in 1961. A pond was dug on the property in 1964. In 1979, CSMEE made more major upgrades to the track with a reverse bend and a figure eight loop with an overhead bridge.

Through this time, model railroad societies were popping up all over New Zealand, with clubs in New Plymouth, Wanganui, Dunedin, Timaru, Southland, Nelson, Waikato, Blenheim and Picton among others. The CSMEE exhibited its models regularly at various events around the country and welcomed the public to ride at its track.

In 2000, several members attended the Brotherhood of Live Steamers' Annual Rally. They came



back excited about the possibilities of 7 ¼" gauge layouts. Unfortunately, the Andrews Crescent location could not accommodate the larger gauge. After some soul- and locationsearching, and seeing the worldwide movement to ground-level track, the club decided to move to their current location in Halswell Domain in 2002.

The first peg was put in on July 3, 2003, and approximately 12 months later the "gold spike", marking the completion of the 1 km ground-level track, was hammered home. The Halswell complex was officially opened on 3 May 2004. However, that wasn't an end to the construction work – they kept working on two more rail tracks, an engine shed and the pond. They scheduled a Canmod rally at their track in 2006 and, racing against the clock, were still laying rails the night before opening.

The track made it through the 2011 earthquake with relatively little damage, and being open to the public afterward when many other entertainment venues were closed, picked up significant ridership in that period. They built a clubhouse, two tunnels and a decorative mountain on top.

The inclusion of a boating club is an unusual feature in a railroading club. The boaters have a 60foot-wide pond and run everything from speedboats to yachts, destroyers and container boats, much as we run everything from speeders to GP-9s. They have sailboats, steamboats, and gas and electric motors.

Today, the club's focus is on extending their ground level track.

Ground Level Track: 980m long, 5" and 7 1/4" gauge. 720m extension is a current work in progress, and the first stage will be open by the end of the year.

Raised track: 270m long, 2 1/2", 3 1/2" and 5" gauge.

Membership: 138 paid members.

Harvest Host traffic, year-round, is also picking up with the warmer weather and nicer roads.

Charlie Bill Schubert, a long-time member, recently passed away. He spent many hours almost daily at Train Mountain working on various projects and in most recent years helping build track in the Track Shop. Our condolences go out to his wife and to his many friends and family.

Upcoming is the Narrow Gauge work week and meet. Several people are already registered! And, as always, we are expecting more sign-ups.

The Hope Circle Picnic Shelter crew will be dedicating the shelter on Saturday, June 3, 2023 at the Hope Circle Picnic Shelter at the north end of the track. Festivities start at 4:30 PM. Instead of the normal banquet at the Hall of Flags, the banquet will be held at Hope Circle Picnic Shelter. Banquet tickets will be available in the Business Office. Tickets are \$20 per person. Navigating Train Mountain Webpages Danny Chamrad

We've been discussing the various links and information that we find on the TMRR Home Page. I started with this page because this page, and the Live TM Cameras page, is where I get most of my information about TMRR activities. I was getting ready to start the review of the TMRR Home Page "left-column, green-background links," when I saw that the first link is the TMRR Home webpage link which is just a link to the webpage that is currently being viewed. The second link is a link to the TM Landing Page. When I clicked on this link, I had one of those ah-ha moments. If you search the internet for TM Railroad Museum, one of the links that you will be see is the TM Landing Page link, <u>https://trainmtn.org/</u>. I guess that I should've begun our discussions with this page, because from this page, we can literally drill down to all of the other webpages that we have reviewed and will be reviewing. However, our ship has already sailed, so let's go forward with our journey. Remember that I said that you might find it helpful to open the pages that we are discussing in a separate browser tab while we are discussing them to view what I'm talking about.

The TM Landing Page has the heading, "Train Mountain Railroad Museum Chiloquin ~ Oregon." Below the heading are some statistics on the size and world record status of TMRR. Next, there is a "bookmarks ribbon" with links to TM Museum, Museum Walking Tour, Visitor Information, TMRR, Camera Page, TMInst, About Us, Friends, and K&W RR webpages.

Below the bookmarks ribbon is an automated picture montage of people/events which have come to TMRR. Below the rolling picture show are five message blocks with links to other webpages. The message blocks have links to Train Mountain Museum, Train Mountain Railroad, Train Mountain Institute, Friends of Train Mountain, and Klamath & Western Railroad webpages. The message block links have matching links in the bookmarks ribbon. The message blocks link for Train Mountain Museum is the same link as the TM Museum bookmarks link. The message blocks link for Train Mountain Railroad is the same link as the TMRR bookmarks link. The message blocks link for Train Mountain Institute is the same link as the TMInst bookmarks link. The message blocks link for Train Mountain Institute is the same link as the TMInst bookmarks link. The message blocks link for Friends of Train Mountain is the same link as the Friends bookmarks link. The message blocks link for Klamath & Western Railroad is the same link as the K&W RR bookmarks link. The message blocks are Museum Walking Tour, Visitor Information, Camera Page (which can be accessed from the TMRR page), and About Us.

Let's follow the Museum Walking Tour link. The Museum Walking Tour page has the heading, "Train Mountain Railroad Museum Walking Tour." The bookmarks ribbon has links to TMInst Home, Train Mtn RR Museum, Walking Tour, Location, About/Contact Us, tmrr.org, FTM, and Videos. Below the bookmarks ribbon are several message boxes with information about the walking tour, as well as some links showing pictures of the equipment which is seen on the walking tour. Click on the Walking Tour link, and you will still be looking at the same page. The only two links on this bookmark ribbon that aren't on the TM Landing Page are the Location and Video links. Let's discuss these two links now and cover the other links when we go back to the TM Landing Page.

When you click on the Location link, you are taken to a page with the heading "Train Mountain Railroad Museum." If you notice, the bookmarks ribbon links are the same as the bookmarks ribbon on the Museum Walking Tour page. For those of you have been involved in building websites/ webpages, you understand how this happens when you build a new page linked from a previous page. On this Location page, there is a Google map which shows Chiloquin, Hwy. 97, Train Mountain Railroad Museum, the local rivers, and other landmarks. As you scroll down the map, there are some directions to TM along with some other information. Now, let's go back to the TMR Museum Walking Tour page and click on the Videos link. You will be taken to another page with the heading, "Train Mountain Institute," and again, the same bookmarks toolbar. On this page, there are a couple of videos of trains running the rails at TMRR, and the same "page footer" data as we have seen before on other pages.

Returning to the TMR Museum Walking Tour page, we will next discuss the message boxes and links on this page. The first message boxes lists the hours of operation of the walking tours and a reminder to check in at the Business Office before starting the walking tour. As a reminder to all TM Members, if you bring someone with you to TM who is not a TM Member, always take them by the Business Office to fill out some paperwork which is required for them to be on the TM grounds.

The second message box discusses some of the railroad equipment on display at TM Museum.

The third message box has two links, with an orange-shaded background, labeled "Self Guided Walking Tour Map" and "Self Guided Walking Tour Guide." If you hold your cursor over the Self-Guided Walking Tour Map, the map will open. If you move your cursor to look at the map, the map will close. However, while your cursor is hovering over the link and the map is showing, if you scroll down, the map will scroll up over your cursor. You can then right-click on the map, select "open image in new tab", and the map will open in a separate tab. At that point, you can move the map around as you like without the map disappearing. The same thing can be done with the tour guide link. These links, of course, will be helpful to view these "walking tour" aids before you get to TM, unless of course, you have an electronic device with you where you can view them while walking around TM. I think that there are some walking tour aids given out in the Visitor Center which are similar to these aids.

The fourth message box reminds visitors not to climb onto the equipment unless there are stairs provided.

The last group of message boxes have listings of equipment which are numbered so as to provide a guide to the walking tour. If you hover your cursor over the equipment description, a picture of that equipment will show on your monitor. It is a nice way view the equipment online.




2022 Triennial Video Now Available



Visitors to Train Mountain and YOU:

Train Mountain is very popular and is continually attracting visitors from throughout the world. We announce that our hours are from 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM Monday through Friday during the summer, and 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM during the winter.
