Dennis Ward spoke about the new track at Beauchamp, thanking all the folks that helped with that this week. Steve Eddy spoke about the success of the Train Game this year, and indicated that he is working on some scoring changes for next year. He also mentioned the need for push buttons to operate the new switch at Antis, which was duly noted by the signals team. Next, Gil Dominguez gave an update on the Hope Shelter indicating that the roof is now on, except for the roof cap. Thanks to the team for their hard work. A picnic at Hope is now officially on my to-do list. Jerry Crane closed out the evening giving a brief report on TMI and introducing our new neighbors who bought the Balf property.

There are a few other items of business that I can report. The schedule for next years' meets has recently been approved and published on the website. It's not too soon to start thinking about travel

plans for next summer. Also, Dale Furseth has informed me that he recently installed more ties in the track through our memorial garden near the flag pole. These ties have engraved on them the names of members who have passed on. If you get a chance, walk over to the garden and remember these folks.

This year, the Fall Colors Meet, which typically does not have an attached work week, turned into a very productive week of hard work—just like last year. A dedicated group of members calling themselves the “Wonder Bread Crew” showed up the week before the meet and completed a track installation project that has been on the books for years.

The team of volunteers laid 1500' of plastic, 150 track panels (weighing 140 pounds each) and 100 cubic yards of ballast, and then made sure it was dead smooth and level. This has been such a great effort by a whole bunch of people who I cannot thank enough. Every time the call goes out for help on a tough project, this crew, led by Matt Thomas, answers the call and consistently delivers above and beyond. Every member who has come and enjoyed Train Mountain has enjoyed the hard work of this group.

Also thanks to Dennis Ward, our Train Mountain Track Superintendent. Your guidance and encouragement keep me on the right track!

To access the new track, when coming down hill from Witcombe, right before you get to Beauchamp (at the top of Aspen Loop), there is a new switch that goes off to the left. This new bypass track takes you around the outside of Aspen Loop, down to Elizabeth River. The purpose for the new track is to provide some options when running on the north side, and to allow a train returning from the north side to take the track all the way round Aspen Loop – and not just half Aspen.

After the crew finished that task, they spent a day moving drainage rock for the Panama project.

This piece is an **important asset on our layout** as it is one of the largest model buildings we have. **Most visitors and members get an opportunity to view this structure, giving it “Show Piece” status.** Due to its size, most work must be done in situ.

After discussions between Bill Kludt and **Jim Eakin**, Jim volunteered to take on the project and has been **working diligently on it for several months**. Jim is also responsible for some construction and most of the maintenance of the buildings at **Lillyville** with direction and support from the Lilly family. He has brought those same **skills and imagination to this project**.

Navigating Train Mountain Webpages

As you may know by now, the camera servers decided that this would be a great time to malfunction. Murphy was Right Again!

Some of the camera servers, which refresh/replace their pictures after a set time period, are back up again, but the ones that store “historical pictures from each day” are not fully functioning yet. 


2018 Triennial Video Now Available

I AM NOT A ROBOT!

There have been a few changes made to the member's site, specifically where payment information is entered. The most noticeable change is that we have added a question asking if you are a robot. You check the box and depending on a bunch of things, you may be asked to choose from a set of pictures. You may be asked to click the pictures that show street signs, or click on pictures that show store fronts. It seems silly, but the questions and challenges are carefully crafted and updated by Google, and have an amazing success rate at determining if the entity pressing the keys is a real person or a computer program ("robot") trying to gain access.

The technology is called "CAPTCHA", or in our case "reCAPTCHA" and is quickly being the standard for online protection against robots, which pose a real problem to web sites. This is replacing the (to me) very irritating practice of trying to figure out what letters and numbers they are showing in fuzzy text. If you have questions or problems getting around the new challenge (or if you are a robot!), feel free to give Joyce a call in the office.

Please use a common open source FONT such as ARIAL that can be displayed in all Browsers, and is easy to read. Please do NOT use the Calibri font, as we must take the time to convert it to Arial.

If your document has an embedded image, you must also include the image separately as a jpg, png, or similar image file.

Visitors to Train Mountain and YOU:

Train Mountain is very popular and is continually attracting visitors from throughout the world. We announce that our hours are from 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM Monday through Friday during the summer, and 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM during the winter. The office is closed on weekends except during meets, and then only when volunteers are available to open the office.

Our insurance advisors request that all people (members and visitors) complete and sign a liability release. If **YOU** as a member encounter visitors on the property without a visitors pass please direct them to the office so that we can insure that a release has been completed and a visitors pass has been issued.

If **YOU**, as a member, open the gate and allow visitors to pass through - **YOU** are responsible to see that the release has been completed, and **YOU** are liable for them until they sign a release. Releases are available in the mailboxes near the office for those times when the office is closed. There are also releases available in the kitchen and in the Back Shop.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM) (Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through Friday. To arrange other hours visitors should call the office at 541-783-3030.

Train Mountain is a NO SMOKING Facility

During recent events, many Members and their Guests have been ignoring this policy. There are only three designated smoking areas at Train Mountain:

- (1) Outside the front of the Backshop
- (2) Outside the east door of the Hall of Flags
- (3) Outside the Motor Pool (Maintenance Building)

Due to the high fire danger at Train Mountain during the summer, we have zero tolerance for anyone smoking outside one of the designated areas.

There is NO SMOKING anywhere out on the track!

Members, Guests, and Visitors that continue to violate the Train Mountain Smoking Policy may be asked to leave.
